They enjoyed exploring a range of subjects throughout the day, gaining valuable insight into the options available to them. The event also provided an opportunity for pupils to strengthen friendships and build new connections across the Trust community.

PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITON

The Trust's Key Stage 3 Debate Team achieved a triumphant win in the inaugural Effingham Schools Trust Public Speaking Competition. They researched and delivered a passionate argument on the motion 'Why electric cars are the only road to take', competing against teams of Year 9 pupils.











PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITON

St Teresa's hosted the annual Effingham Schools Trust Public Speaking Competition for Senior pupils. The topics covered a wide range of issues, including cloning, Al, the death penalty, conspiracy theories, and the power of words.

St Teresa's Team I were the winners, with Amelia B as Chair, Georgina W as Proposer, and Ella G as Opposer. The team delivered a highly entertaining debate on the motion: Cloning is Unethical. Runners-up were St Teresa's Team 2, who spoke emphatically on the abolition of the death penalty, with Catherine L as Proposer, Lucy T as Opposer, and Ava S as Chair. Congratulations to all pupils who worked incredibly hard researching, writing speeches, and rehearsing for the competition.









FUTURES FAIR

We were delighted to announce the success of the inaugural #EffinghamSchoolsTrust Futures Fair.

The event brought together over 20 exhibitors from a wide range of industries, who engaged with more than 200 students and parents to offer valuable insights into the world of work. In addition to the main fair, pupils attended a panel debate on How to Thrive in Today's Modern Workplace. Panellists included representatives from Google, Starcom, BlackRock, and St. James's Place, covering topics ranging from gender bias to the impact of AI on the job market.

Year 12 students also took part in individual 20-minute workplace interviews, where they received feedback on their CVs and engaged directly with professionals currently working in industry. Exhibitors praised the level of student engagement and the quality of questions asked. Some students have already begun following up on opportunities for work experience, mentoring, and internships.









WORLD SCHOLAR'S CUP

St Teresa's hosted the World Scholar's Cup London—Surrey regional round for the fifth consecutive year. This year marked a milestone, as it was the first time teams from all three schools within the Effingham Schools Trust took part.

Over 170 students and 20 teachers arrived ready to compete in either the junior or senior division across the four main events of the competition. By the end of the first day, teams of three had completed the Team Debate, Collaborative Writing, and Scholars' Challenge. Students returned to compete in the Scholar's Bowl, followed by the Debate Showcase in the afternoon, where Malia G represented the negative team.

Pupils also took part in the Scholars' Show, sharing their talents in dance, singing and piano. The event concluded with a closing ceremony and presentation of awards.

Most teams from across the Trust qualified for the global round, and plans were put in place for a trip to Ljubljana, Slovenia to compete.









YEAR 9 ONE DAY FILM

Pupils from across the Trust took part in a Film Day hosted at Cranmore, bringing together students from St Teresa's and Manor House for a day of creativity, collaboration, and fun. Working in mixed teams, pupils produced their own 10-shot films, showcasing impressive imagination and teamwork.

Whilst not every group received a prize, the true highlight was the opportunity to share and watch each other's work. The event was filled with laughter, applause, and encouragement, creating a warm and supportive atmosphere.

It served as a valuable opportunity to strengthen connections across the Trust, and plans are already being considered for the next collaborative venture.













MOVIE NIGHT

The Trust hosted an open-air movie night for Year II pupils at St Teresa's, with pupils from Cranmore, Manor House, and St Teresa's gathering on the field to enjoy I0 Things I Hate About You—a film selected by popular vote from among the attendees.

Pupils settled in with blankets and enjoyed an array of treats, including popcorn, sweets, hot dogs, and burgers, as they watched the film under the stars. It was a fantastic evening that celebrated community spirit and brought pupils together for a memorable shared experience.











ROTARY DEBATE

Both Manor House and St Teresa's proudly took part in the Rotary Youth Debate Competition, hosted by Downsend School. Competing in the Intermediate age group (11–13), both schools performed exceptionally well, with Manor House securing first place and St Teresa's achieving a strong second.

The winning Manor House team debated the highly relevant topic: "Check your screen time: Social Media is leading us to a digital disaster." They presented a balanced and thoughtful argument, exploring both the dangers and benefits of screen use in today's digital age. Judges praised all teams for their passion, research, and presentation skills. Other thought-provoking topics included:

- A three-day school week
- The impact of artificial intelligence
- Ethical issues in the fashion industry
- Returning artefacts to their countries of origin
- The pros and cons of global tourism

With six teams from Manor House, St Teresa's, and Downsend, the competition showcased young voices tackling significant issues. It was an inspiring event promoting learning, confidence-building, and public speaking.

FRENCH BREAKFAST

Year 5 pupils from St Teresa's and Manor House were welcomed by Cranmore to enjoy a delightful French petit déjeuner. Each table featured conversation prompts that encouraged pupils to get to know each other en français. Pupils enthusiastically asked questions about family, pets, and birthdays, as well as quizzing one another on breakfast items from the table. Conversation and laughter filled the dining room, and despite initial nerves, the children enjoyed forming new friendships.

The highlight of the visit was the food. Year 10 pupils from Cranmore served the first course of the petit déjeuner, which included chocolat chaud served in bowls—a French tradition. Many found this both interesting and a fun way to enjoy their drink, with some discovering it was the perfect vessel for dunking croissants and baguettes. This was followed by pastries such as croissants, pain au chocolat, and baguettes served with confiture à la fraise, accompanied by fresh jus d'orange. The children thoroughly enjoyed the experience, which also provided a lovely opportunity to connect with other schools. The Trust looks forward to the next petit déjeuner français.









YEAR 3 FOREST SCHOOL

Year 3 pupils took part in a special joint Forest School event at Manor House, exploring the theme of Natural Art. The session encouraged creativity through the use of natural materials, with pupils decorating their initials using petals, leaves, and other colourful items found in the environment.

They also created nature frames in triangular and rectangular shapes, filling them with leaves, twigs, and flowers gathered from the Forest School area. Pupils experimented with natural dyes by pounding petals and leaves, and crafted bird nests using paper plates decorated with twigs and feathers.

As part of their Forest School snack, pupils were treated to fried nettles—a unique experience that added to the day's sense of adventure. The event offered a wonderful opportunity for pupils from different Trust schools to collaborate and express their creativity through nature.











STONE AGE DAY

Year 3 pupils enjoyed a fantastic Stone Age themed day at Cranmore. They explored a yurt filled with paintings, replica Stone Age items, and a fire. Pupils learnt about the different Stone Age periods, watched a mackerel being gutted and smoked, and even tried the smoked fish.

They observed flint knapping and tools, including a knife sharper than steel, demonstrated by one of the leaders cutting his own hair. The children then took part in various activities such as making needles from bones, creating string from lime fibre, scraping animal hides for leather, and sharpening tools with whetstones.

They also discovered how bones were used as musical instruments, skins as drums, and animal horns as vessels. Later, pupils built Stone Age shelters, tested their waterproofing, made natural paints, created cave paintings, and toasted bread over the fire using stick forks.











YEAR 4 FLAMENCO WORKSHOP

The Modern Foreign Languages department at St Teresa's organised an exciting Flamenco workshop for Year 4 pupils from across the Trust. Activities included making tissue paper corsages and hair pieces, learning various clapping techniques and rhythms, and hearing a traditional story, all culminating in a Flamenco dance finale.

Pupils thoroughly enjoyed experiencing this vibrant aspect of Spanish culture.







PIED PIPER THEATRE VISIT

Pupils from Nursery through to Year 2 across the Trust visited Cranmore to watch an exciting theatrical performance by the Pied Piper Theatre Company. The children were thrilled by the giant scenery as they entered the auditorium and were captivated by the retelling of The Town Mouse and The Country Mouse.







CCF

The Combined Cadet Force at Effingham Schools Trust proudly hosted students from Cranmore, Manor House, and St Teresa's throughout the year.
